Robert Sorby's...... Captive Ring Tool Reviewed by Alan Moltz

If you like make captive rings or you want to start making rings, I recommend the Captive Ring Tool. The tool is easy to operate, with a steep learning curve. I was making rings within an hour after picking up the tool. With this tool you do not need a "left and right" tool for each size ring. The cutters are double sided so that only one cutter is required to make each size ring one tool, 4 bits and a Allen wrench (the latter is for positioning of the cutter) is what you get with the purchase of the tool. Instructions are very clear and there is no sharpening of the bits after taking them out of the package. It can be purchased at Woodcraft (item #835859) cost \$69.99.

Sorby Captive Ring Tool cuts 4 different sizes of rings, with one tool and 4 interchangeable bits to produce $\dots 3/16$, 1/4, 3/8 and 1/2 " \dots captive rings. Four steps are all that is required in making of the rings:

- 1. Set the desired ring cutter parallel to the axis of turning and make an indicator mark on the wood where you want to form the ring. This is to be done for both the right and left side.
- 2. With a Parting Tool, cut into the wood at these indicated place to the desired ring depth.
- 3. Now move the cutting edge gently cutting, sweep the tool so that the right hand side of the ring is formed. Then adjust the tool so that it is parallel with the shaft (tool is facing to the left) and finish the right hand side of the ring.
- 4. Using the Allen wrench remove the cutter and turn it over. Repeat step 3 above to do the left hand side of the ring.

To sand the inside of the ring I attached the desired sand paper to the shaft under the ring ((using CA glue) turned on the lathe and held the ring against the sanding paper. I repeated the sanding using the different stages of 100 to 220 grit paper (this depends on the wood you are using).

If you do purchase the Captive Ring Cutter the above steps might vary with your own technique, but you will get 'great looking' rings and the cost of the tool is well worth it.

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
