<u>A Way with Wood: Celebrating Craft</u> introduces visitors to the many ways people transform one of nature's most malleable materials to objects of utility, art, and beauty. At the core of the exhibition will be the Museum's shipwrights, who will carry out different projects over the course of the show. Little to no power tools will be used; the focus will be on work using hand tools.

In association with this exhibit, the Museum has two related but distinct opportunities for people who work with wood:

1) Demonstrations within the exhibition:

Complementing the shipwrights' work in the exhibition is a section where outside artisans are invited for periods of time to set up shop to practice and share their craft with the public. This changing stable of craftspeople will feature a variety of different disciplines: wood carving, furniture making, sculpture, and model making are some of the possibilities. The focus should be on work using hand tools, and the displays in *A Way with Wood* will change as new projects, artisans, and objects rotate in and out. The exhibition is intended to evolve over time and provide different views into the world of craftsmanship and wood. Blocks of time ranging from 3 days to 2 weeks are available between August – December 31.

2) <u>Participation in Woodcraft Weekend:</u>

Mystic Seaport Museum will also host Woodcraft Weekend on August 29-30 to educate and inspire visitors in the wide range of ways wood has been shaped by the artisan's hand. We are seeking craftspeople and vendors in all areas of woodworking to participate and showcase their projects and products for the weekend, with an emphasis on demonstration. For example, the Museum will host a tent showcasing rare tools from the collection, offer tool-sharpening demonstrations, and display small boats from our watercraft collection throughout campus. The Museum will be following all best practices regarding safety and Covid-19. There are a limited number of booth spaces available and selections will be made to represent a diverse array of crafts, especially those outside of the maritime field. Activities for children are encouraged.

If you are interested in either or both of the above-listed opportunities, please read the additional information below. At the bottom is a link to a short online application.

Information on demonstrations within the exhibition:

- · Demonstrators and one guest will be admitted to the Museum free of charge for the duration of the demo (which could range from 3 days to 2 weeks depending on the demonstrator's availability)
- · No payment will be provided, and no fees will be charged to the demonstrator
- · Demonstrators will have the opportunity to access special collections areas, at predetermined times
- · The Museum is open 7 days a week
- Demonstrators will be expected to work and engage with visitors in the Collins Gallery from 10am-4pm (with a break for lunch) during the duration of their demo; days off during long stays will be discussed and agreed-upon on a case by case basis
- The Museum will provide access to power
- \cdot Demonstrators should bring everything that they need to do their work; a work bench (60" W x 31" H x 31" D) will be available but no other equipment or tools can be provided by the Museum
- · Accommodations are not provided
- · If you are selected as a demonstrator, Mystic Seaport Museum will provide an agreement for you to sign
- The primary focus of demonstrations will be educational; if you have a business you'd like to promote, an 8.5" x 11" tabletop sign will be provided for this purpose
- \cdot Museum staff, visitors, and demonstrators will be required to adhere to all state and Museum guidelines regarding Covid-19

Information on Woodcraft Weekend:

- · Exhibitors and one guest will be admitted to the Museum free of charge for the weekend
- \cdot Vendors selling items are encouraged to apply but will be subject to final approval by Event Network, the Museum's third party retail partner
- There is a fee of \$100 for selected retail vendors to participate in Woodcraft Weekend (there is no fee to participate if you are only demonstrating, and not selling anything)
- Please contact <u>arlene.marcionette@mysticseaport.org</u> if you are interested in sponsoring Woodcraft Weekend
- \cdot $\;$ There will be no additional charge to the public for the event, beyond admission to the Museum
- · A guided tour of the Museum's Watercraft Hall and early morning access to *A Way with Wood* will be available for exhibitors
- · We expect up to 1,000 visitors per day
- · Booths will be placed all around our 19-acre campus to encourage social distancing
- Exhibitors will be expected to have their booths open from 10am-4pm on Saturday and Sunday
- · Exhibitors should provide their own pop-up tent; the Museum will provide tables and chairs, and access to power
- Exhibitors should bring everything that will be needed to provide their demonstrations; no tools or equipment can be provided by the Museum
- · There will be a dedicated space available for demonstrations; the Museum will provide a wireless headset and PA system
- · Accommodations are not provided
- · Vehicles can drive on the grounds prior to 9:45am and after 5pm each day for load-in and load-out
- · If you are selected as an exhibitor, Mystic Seaport Museum will provide an agreement for you to sign
- · Museum staff, visitors, and exhibitors will be required to adhere to all state guidelines regarding Covid-19; Mystic Seaport Museum reserves the right to make any necessary changes to the event. If the event is cancelled, any fees paid by vendors will be refunded.
