- Mike Silver segmented ruffled edge vase (ambrosia maple)
- Curtis Strong 9 titanium/rhodium/gold pens. Amboyna burl, mallee burl, desert ironwood, holy land olivewood, masur birch, dyed maple burl & 3 acrylics.
- A sanding presentation followed given by Albert D'Antonio, Bob Friedrich, Mike Silver and Corey Anderson.
  - Albert spoke of the evolution of sanding for him. Currently he uses a Sioux sander that he got from Seiplus.com for \$39.95. Crepe box is great for cleaning sandpaper. And Coastal Tool in W. Hartford has sandpaper.
  - Bob also uses a Sioux sander and recommends Save More in S. Windsor for Sioux sanders. , Bob likes to cut his own 2" disks. Norton paper from Canada as good quality 320/400 grit papers.
  - Mike prefers to sand by hand and uses sandpaper to shape many of his pieces. Mike explained his sanding technique in regards to the segmented piece that he brought for show & yell. He also uses mineral oil moisten sand paper this reduces dust. He also prefers to sand outside as natural light shows more of the "flaws" than incandescent lighting.
  - Corey demonstrated his air sander. 5" hook & loop porter cable air sander attached to a 5.5cu ft compressor. Recommends to always sand on a slow speed. Corey also uses the oil sanding method.

Next meeting: June at the Connecticut Valley School of Woodworking located at the Manchester Woodcraft and will be a review of the Yankee Woodturners Symposium.

### Wood of the Month! - Western red Cedar

Thuja plicata (Cupressaceae)

Grows: Canada & USA (also in New Zealand & the UK)

**Health risks**: Asthma, rhinitis, dermatitis, mucous membrane irritations, nosebleeds, stomach pains, nausea, giddiness & disturbance to the central nervous system.

**Description:** Its heartwood can vary from salmon-pink to dark chocolate brown. With time it will age to a reddish brown. Its sapwood is whitish & is clearly differentiated from the heartwood. It is has straight & even grain with a coarse texture, non-resinous and although it smells like cedar it is not a true cedar.

**Properties:** Works satisfactorily with hand tools. Its straight grain allows for easy splitting. Its acid properties can corrode iron. Weathers well for outdoor furniture.

**Typical Uses:** Boat & shipbuilding, roofing shingles, exterior cladding(siding), decorative veneers beehives, sheds & greenhouses and some guitar parts.
