BURL AUCTION AT JANUARY MEETING!!! BRING CASH!!!



- Presentation followed on Shop layout & facility designs.
 - Dave Miner designed his shop when they were building his new home. Planned layout! Everything in its place. Also showed pictures of the East Lyme Middle School where he teaches.
 - Chris Zibbideo 8x12 shed. Get the maximum use in the least amount of space! Mini jet, full size lathe, 2 drill presses, 1" belt sander, and a storage closet.
 - Dayton Stimson Uses shower curtains to enclose himself & his lathe to keep the sawdust from going everywhere. Made a handy PVC tool rack to keep his tools close at hand.
 - Corey Anderson Also uses shower curtains but more to keep the chips from covering his benches. Laura (his wife) was credited for helping in the shop layout - all tools are within reach. Tools are kept in a revolving tool tower right near at hand. Improved on his dust collection system with a larger hood.
 - Al Czellecz revamped a 2-car garage. Overhead halogen lights are excellent (but can get a little hot). Covered an old hospital IV pole stand with Velcro for holding his Velcro backed sanding disks so that they are right there when he needs them. Rubber mats are a must not only for you but also for when you drop a tool. Used copper piping to hold rolls of sandpaper
 - John Lorch gave a demo on making a homemade vacuum chuck. Purchased new from Oneway they can cost \$739, with parts from Surplus Supply & the local hardware stores it costs \$267!!! John handed out spec sheets for those that wanted them.

Turn, turn turn, to everything there is a season

The following commentary was written by Terese Karmel and published in the Willimantic Chronical on October 20, 2006

What I should have asked after a massive tree was uprooted in my front yard during last May's wind and rain was "Where are the woodturners when you need them?" Not quite ghostbusters, they are, however, equally community-minded and welcome when they roll up to a property in their vans and trucks, wearing thick gloves and carrying saws, ready for work. They are the Central Connecticut Woodturners and they have a rare gift: they can make something dead come to life again.

This they have done with an historic copper beech that was cut down a few years back (amid much controversy) at the University of Connecticut's Avery Point campus. There they tamed a limb or two (I'm really oversimplifying this) into a collection of lovely, polished wood pieces and sculptures that are now permanently on exhibit in the historic Branford house in a display case also created by the woodturners.

They are currently engaged in creating works from the limbs of a quartet of ancient trees in Windham (a box elder, a hickory, a black walnut and a copper beech) which had to be cut down because of rot, safety and other concerns, They will be presented to the Windham Garden Club in time for a Dec. 16 fundraiser for the new Windham Garden on the Bridge.

But the immediate concern here is the (fortunate) fate of a 250-year-old sugar maple that spread itself across the heart of Chaplin Street, in the heart of the town with the same name.

(Is there a lovelier street this time of year than Chaplin Street?) CL&P had been badgering the various property owners and the town to take the tree, the oldest in town, down for years because the utility feared it would fall on a transformer across the street. (They finally moved the transformer: Score one for the natural world.)

Sometime in the late 1990s, it got a stay of execution thanks to a petition from residents. But two years ago the tree, which stood on private property, finally had to come down after a branch fell across a driveway and almost hit a child.

Even then, there was great reluctance by everyone to take down this piece of history but sometimes practicality has to take precedence over nostalgia.

For who knows how long, families had picnicked in the shade of that tree. In the spring, a Chaplin schoolteacher used to bring her class to that tree to tap it for syrup. In the fall, its burst of orange, red and copper drew residents from miles to wonder at its beauty. In the winter, no doubt, it had been home to a holiday ornament or two. It even had a nickname, "Grandma," given it by residents who each Halloween gave the tree a kind of SpongeBob SquarePants face with two large puffy eyes wedged between branches and a big grinning mouth with two (widespread) front teeth.

And so the tree, by this point fortified with steel bars, came down. That's when the Woodturners, from their various communities throughout the state, arrived to claim the wood and keep the tree alive in the hearts of those who loved it.

A year ago, the woodturners presented the town with 44 beautifully lacquered vases, pens, platters, bowls, honey dippers - everything and anything that could be made out of wood that have been on display at various places throughout Chaplin. But Saturday, these pieces will be auctioned off at a 7 p.m. event at the Chaplin Senior Center to raise funds for the library, the museum and other good causes and institutions.

Gil Hite, titular head of the woodturners -this designation will infuriate him since they're nothing if not egalitarian - said some of the wood was "punky" (read "soft") while he was working on it and, once, as he was turning a piece, a bunch of ants came flying out at him.

Still the lathes kept turning in Willimantic, in Columbia, in Mansfield and other places where the woodturners turn, and the pieces were turned out. And now they can belong to anyone with the high bid and a love of the past.

As I was writing this earlier this week, I left my desk for a few minutes and when I returned found a lovely pen created by Hite from scraps of Angelique, a brown wood from South America, used in the construction of the Amistad freedom schooner. (The woodturner had been there too).

I know all about the limits to accepting gifts in this profession but this one I'll keep. And when I use the pen, I'll know I'm holding the passion of an artist as well as a piece of history in my hand.
