Wood of the Month

European Ash Fraxinus excelsior (Oleaceae)

Grows: Europe, North Africa & western Asia.

Health risks: Decrease in lung function, rhinitis and asthma

Description: The sapwood & heartwood are not clearly defined. The color is generally cream to tan to dark brown. The wood is tough, heavy and straight grained.

Properties: Ash is excellent for steam bending, but the curving grain can catch, splinter or tear. Works well with both hand and machine tools with a moderate blunting. Predrilling is necessary

Typical Uses: Used for sports equipment such as bats, racquets, polo mallets, cricket stumps and oars. Also used for cabinetmaking, turnery, tool handles, paneling and decorative veneers. It was tradition-



ally used for coachbuilding and wheelwrighting.




