Turning Small

One of the recurring myths of woodturning goes something like "the longer you turn wood, the larger the piece you want to make." Instead, for many wood turners the desire is to turn work that is more intricate and from more exotic woods. The ideal are for this type of work is found in small woodturning projects.

Fine details often get lost in the scope of a large piece of work. They exactly fit in small pieces. Once a project pattern has been selected, appropriate wood also needs to be prepared. Here the small project shines. Even exotic woods can be used at low cost simply because the volume is so small. Better yet, if local wood is the choice, it can often be discovered in the wood pile for next to nothing.

Small woodturning projects can be held easily in the hand. This allows them to be viewed easily from a variety of angles and consideration can be given to changes that may be made in the next one. For instance, if beads are now simple to turn it may be time to incorporate more in the next project. On the other hand it may instead be time to turn less beads and more coves until these are as easy. Large projects allow the same considerations but with larger time constraints as well as costs.

In addition, in today's fast paced world, small projects allow the busy woodturner an opportunity to get into the shop and complete a piece of work without many of the pressures of the rest

of the day. The shop truly becomes a refuge from the bustle of the work place as small woodturning projects come to the fore.

The American Association of Woodturners

will celebrate its 25-year anniversary in 2011 at the St. Paul symposium. One of the many special events there will be an exhibition, Turning 25 - A Celebration. Each chapter of the AAW is encouraged and welcome to enter this exhibit. The exhibit goal is to have every AAW chapter represented and for each chapter to enter a lathe-turned work that exemplifies and represents that chapter.

The chapter can choose its own process for selecting a piece for the show, whether it is collaborative effort, or a chapter juried selection from members' work. Entries for the show will be submitted online on the AAW website. Ground rules for each piece are:



- One piece per chapter
- Piece must fit in an 8" cube
- Weight limit is 3 pounds
- Entry fee is \$40
- Entry deadline is February 28, 2011
- All entered work must be for sale
- All pieces must remain with the exhibit for any traveled venues after the symposium
- Sales will be shared 70% with the chapter/or artist and 30% with the AAW
- Sold work will be shipped to the buver at the end of all exhibits,

and unsold work will be returned to the chapter

The entry fee will help defray the expense of a special display setup, return shipping to the buyer or the chapter, plus a very nice exhibit catalog for each participating chapter that will have a picture and description of each exhibit piece. The exhibit will be displayed in a prominent area at the symposium and each participating chapter will be clearly recognized for their contribution.

Wood of the Month Osage-Orange Maclura pomifera (Moraceae)

Grows: Europe includina United Kingdom, Turkey

and USA

Health risks: Not known

Description: When freshly cut the heartwood varies from greenishyellow to bright orange. Over time it will darken to a russet brown. Wood is straight close grain and somewhat course in texture.

Properties: It is a tough, heavy, very hard and resilient wood. Blunts tools.

Typical Uses: Posts, stakes, insulator pins, tobacco pipes, machinery parts, turnery, railway sleepers (ties), wheel hubs, rims and archery bows.

Add'I facts: Also know as bow wood, bodare, bodark, bois d'arc, hedge apple, horse apple, naranjo chino and mock orange.

The fruit has a pleasant and mild odor, but is inedible for the most part. Although it is not strongly poisonous, eating it may cause

vomiting. However, the seeds of the fruit are edible.


The Osage-orange is commonly used as a tree row windbreak in prairie states, which gives it one of its colloquial names, "hedge apple". It was one of the primary trees used in President Franklin Delano Roosevelt's "Great Plains Shelterbelt" WPA project,

which was

launched in 1934 as an ambitious plan to modify weather and prevent soil erosion in the Great Plains states, and by 1942 resulted

in the planting of 30,233 shelterbelts containing 220 million trees that stretched for 18,600 miles (29,900 km). The sharp-thorned trees were also planted as cattledeterring hedges before the introduction of barbed wire and afterward became an important source of fence posts.

fects in Bowls & Platters

here are some ways to put the odds
in your favor:

- Perform all rough turning at on time
- Some woods must dry more slowly
- Wider pieces need special attention
- Pay attention to wall thickness
- Pay attention to wall shape
