will celebrate its 25-year anniversary in 2011 at the St. Paul symposium. One of the many special events there will be an exhibition, Turning 25 – A Celebration. Each chapter • of the AAW is encouraged • and welcome to enter this exhibit. The exhibit goal is to • have every AAW chapter represented and for each chapter • to enter a lathe-turned work that exemplifies and represents that chapter.

The chapter can choose its own process for selecting a piece for the show, whether it is collaborative effort, or a chapter juried selection from members' work. Entries for

the show will be submitted online on the AAW website. Ground rules for each piece are:

- One piece per chapter
- Piece must fit in an 8" cube
- Weight limit is 3 pounds
- Entry fee is \$40
- Entry deadline is February 28, 2011
- All entered work must be for sale
- All pieces must remain with the exhibit for any traveled venues after the symposium
- Sales will be shared 70% with the chapter/or artist and 30% with the AAW
- Sold work will be shipped to the buyer at the end of all exhibits, and unsold work will be returned to



the chapter

The entry fee will help defray the expense of a special display setup, return shipping to the buyer or the chapter, plus a very nice exhibit catalog for each participating chapter that will have a picture and description of each exhibit piece. The exhibit will be displayed in a prominent area at the symposium and each participating chapter will be clearly recognized for their contribution.

Wood of the Month Brazilian Tulipwood (Dalbergia frutescens)

Grows: Mainly north-eastern Brazil, Columbia, Guyana and Venezuela

Health risks: Not known

Description: Sapwood is solid yellow in color. Heartwood has variegated striped figure with varying shades of pink, rose-red to violet.

Properties: The wood is heavy, hard and dense wood. Causes severe blunting. Preboring is recommended.

Typical Uses: Furniture, cabinet making, turning, veneer for paneling, inlays, bandings, marquetry, antique restoration and jewelry boxes

Holiday Ornament



This quick-tomake lightbulb ornament is sure to brighten up the holidays. Whether you


choose to stain them an assortment of colors as shown or make them out of different colored wood species, you can quickly turn out a tree full of these delightful Christmas ornaments for many seasons of holiday cheer.

- Materials: 1³/₈" X 1³/₈" X 3³/₄" wood blank, ⁷/₁₆" O.D brass tube, brass screw eye.
- Mount the brass tubing CARE-FULLY in the 4 jaw chuck. Clean with brass cleaner and part off a ¹/₂" length.
- Put blank between centers, turn round and put a tenon on the end to fit your 4 jaw chuck.
- Mount blank in chuck...turn to final diameter 1⁵/₁₆"
- Face off the right hand end then

drill a

Mark the

 $3^{1}/8^{1}$ from the end.



- From the 1³/₈" line, shape the bottom of the light bulb down hill to the brass tube.
- At the 3¹/₈" line, make a parting cut to form a ¹/₂" cylinder.
- Shape the top of the bulb, sanding as you go...until the bulb is separated
- With a sharp knife, finish the tip
- Glue in the screw eye, mask the brass and color with your choice of wood dyes, or paint...remove the mask and finish with several coats of clear lacquer.

DIRECTIONS:

From Hartford and West: Route 84 E to I-384 E to Route 6 E ("Providence, Willimantic") Take Route 6 to Columbia (about 11 miles). Take a left at the light just past Columbia Ford/Lincoln/Mercury onto the Route 6 Expressway towards Providence. Get off at the second exit ("To 195 University of Connecticut Storrs"). At the light at end of exit take a left. Go straight at the next light and take a right onto Independence Drive (Freedom Green).

***Go to the end of Independence Dr. and you will run right into the parking lot of the Clubhouse (no sign). The Clubhouse is flanked by the pool on the left and the tennis courts on the right. Park in the parking lot. If the lot is full, park on the street, but only on one side of the street.

From Bloomfield ,Windsor, etc., I-291 E to I-384 E and follow the same directions as above from there. Follow the above directions from ***

From Norwich, etc., Take Rt. 32 to Windham and go over the "Frog Bridge" to Willimantic. Go straight at the light at the bottom of the Frog Bridge and follow that road until you get to a large intersection. There will be a traffic light and a Cumberland Farms on your left and a Hess(?) Chucky's gas station on your right and Mama's Pizza almost directly ahead. At that light bear left. The left side of Mama's will be on your right. Follow that road to the end. At the stop sign, turn left and go to the light. Turn right at the light and go to the next light. Go straight at the light and take your second right onto Independence Drive (Freedom Green). Follow the above directions from ***

From Rhode Island and East Take Route 6 W to North Windham and bear right onto the Route 6 W Expressway. Take the first exit to the light at the end of the ramp and turn left. Go to the next light and turn right. Take your second right onto Independence Drive. Follow the above directions from ***

From Storrs, etc. Take Route 195 (Storrs Rd) South toward Willimantic to Puddin Lane. Go right onto Puddin Lane and a left onto Liberty Drive. Follow the above directions from ***
