Professional Outreach Program (POP)

"The mission of the Professional Outreach Program is to promote a greater understanding of professionalism within the field of contemporary woodturning."

The Professional Outreach Program Committee operates under the auspices of the Board of Directors of the American Association of Woodturners, and will publicize its activities and achievements in the American Woodturner Journal, and at the AAW symposiums.

Our purpose is to:

→ Encourage and assist members of the woodturning commu-

nity in the development of their professional skills.

- → Help advance and promote the woodturning field as a legitimate medium of art.
- → Generate ideas, concepts and programs on subjects of a professional nature to benefit the woodturning community.
- → Organize exhibitions.
- ★ Conduct a variety of panel discussions of relevant topics on professionalism at AAW symposiums.
- → Recognize individuals who have demonstrated high standards of professionalism throughout their careers

POP Funding is through the POP exhibition auctions held at the AAW symposium each year that

provide funding for all POP programs.

The POP gives biennial "Merit Awards" to individuals selected by the Committee who have shown exceptional development in their careers as artists and whose artworks have directly influenced or had a significant impact on other artists within the field of woodturning as a whole. This award is distinct from the Lifetime Achievement Award given by the AAW, as it focuses on artistic excellence rather than on contributions to the AAW, per se. Wood of the Month Timborana (Enterolobium schomburgkii)



Grows: Central & Latin America

Health risks: The dust may cause contact dermatitis.

Description: The narrow sapwood is yellowish to a deep cream color. With the heartwood being yellowish brown with dark streaks. The grain is often

straight occasionally interlocking.

Properties: Timborana causes moderate blunting of cutting edges. Pre-boring is not required. It sands, turns, stands and polishes well.

Typical Uses: Used for interior paneling, interior and external

joinery, flooring, cabinetry, sliced veneer, heavy carpentry, hydraulic works, sleepers, tool handles, turned goods, bridges, stairs, rail road ties.

Meet Jim Kephart



Many of you know Jim Kephart as that guy that opens his shop to CCW for our

meetings and Open Shop Sundays.

Jim's woodturnings include Architectural, Reproduction and Artistic work. He turns by hand, not duplicator, so he is the perfect choice when you need small to medium quantities of parts. His attention to detail insures that all edges are crisp and surfaces are ready for finish, whether painted or left natural. He specializes in thin and delicate parts.

Jim has been turning wood since 1976. The early years of woodturning were primarily a hobby and source of gifts. Although he created artistic pieces



and bowls, his main interest seemed to be related to making items. This led more to spindle turning. He currently owns and operates a wood-turning business located in Manchester Connecticut were he specializes in hand woodturning of furniture parts, balusters, columns, and prototype woodturnings.

Over the years, Jim has done more than a few demonstrations and classes on many topics including:

- Spindle turning
- Skew use
- Tool Control, safety and turning projects
- Tool making
- Hollow form turning
- Tool sharpening
- Duplicating spindles by hand turning.

Jim also designed and taught woodturning classes at Harris Enterprise in Manchester Connecticut for 5 years (approximately 4 classes per year). Classes include Beginning Woodturning, Hollow Turning, Bowl Turning Class.

While Jim's turning resume is impressive, he is a very easy going layed back person. Recently I spent a day (during the week) with Jim at

his shop to see BIG wood turning first hand.

When we come to Jim's shop for a meeting or open house, he has cleaned up & put away his projects. So this was interesting to see all that he was working on. The picture to the left shows what Jim had in the works that day. Broken balusters, chair rungs, knobs, lamps and an assortment of what nots filled the table. There was a wooden crate from Texas with a very ornate baluster that Jim worked on while I was there. Jim turned the majority of it, but it needed some specialty carving. Anneliese (Jim's wife) is an excellent carver and helps Jim when the lathe tools just won't work.

Lunchtime came and we went to a local Mexican restaurant for a quick bite to eat and then back to work.

By the end of the day, Jim had finished his part on the Texas balusters, had several customers come in for orders, answered some calls, were entertained by the various bands that are tenants of the building & joked around a bit.

Jim is a stickler for safety, as we all should be. Recently while turning a

safety precautions, more than a gouge and lathe bed could have been damaged!



If you've ever wondered what type of tree was nearby but didn't have a guide book, a new smartphone app allows users with no formal training to satisfy their curiosity an contribute to science at the same time.

mobile app to identify plants by simply photographing a leaf. The free iPhone and iPad, app called Leafsnap, instantly searches a

growing library of leaf images amassed Leafsnap debuted in May, covering all by the Smithsonian Institute. In seconds, it returns a likely species name, high-resolution photographs and information on the tree's flowers, fruit, seeds and bark.
