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### Quotes.....by Ira Glass

**Nobody** tells this to people who are beginners. I wish someone told me. All of us who do creative work, we get into it because we have good taste. But there is this gap. For the first couple years you make stuff, it's **just not that good**. It's *trying* to be good, it has *potential*, but it's not. But your *taste*, the thing that got you into the game, is *still killer*. And your taste is why your work disappoints you. A lot of people *never* get past this phase; they quit. Most people I know who do *interesting, creative* work went through years of this. We know our work doesn't have this *special thing* that we want it to have. We *all* go through this. And if you are just starting out or you are still in this phase, you gotta know that it's normal and the most important think you can do is to **do a lot of work**. Put yourself on a **deadline** so that every week you finish one pieces. It's only by going through a **volume of work** that you can close that gap, and your work will be as good as **your ambitions**. And I took longer to figure out how to do this than any-one I've ever met. It's gonna take a while. It's *normal* to take awhile. You just **gotta fight** your way through.

### Wood of the Month White Ash (*Frazinus americna*)

**Grows**: Canada & USA **Health risks**: Decrease in lung function, rhinitis &

### asthma

**Description:** Grain is typically straight-grained and coarse with an even texture and lustrous. It is an open grained wood with distinctive rows of tiny open pores that will show up even when it is painted or heavily stained.

**Properties:** Works well with machine & hand tools. Can cause moderate blunting to tools. Pre-boring may be needed for the harder species. It polishes, stains & glues well. **Typical Uses:** Oars, bats, pool cues, tool handles, interior joinery and decorative veneers

**Additional Information:** In North America the borer is an invasive species, highly destructive to ash trees

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## **End Grain Turning**

### **Jerry Sambrook**



Jerry proceeded to 'chip' various club members that were fortunate to be seating in the front row.

Reverse the piece

and clamp in the chuck. Jerry prefers to use dovetail jaw chucks, as they do a better job holding. Then bring the tail stock



up.

When turning end grain bowls you can use either a pull cut or a scraper.



Jerry uses the rule of on-thirds. Meaning the flange should be one third the bowl diameter. This is also true with the foot.

Jerry reverse chucked the piece. Us-



chuck, he proceeded to remove the While removing the tenon, tenon. he slightly undercut the foot area.

The piece is then placed in a paper bag for several weeks to fully dry.

showed the club what to do with those 4-6" slices of wood that are too small for bowl.





of the surface. Note that the pith may or may not be in the center of the piece. This can be a creative design feature that you can take advantage of.



Jerry recommends using a center. step The step center adds a level of security to the turning and also does not mar surfaces.

Jerry does not face off either end, but rather starts right off shaping the piece and adding the tenon. Using a 1/2" bowl gouge, he gradually tapers

towards the tail stock.

Generally the tenon is not part of the final foot.



The Central Connecticut Woodturners (CCW) was founded in 1994 to support the needs of woodturners in the central Connecticut area. Its purpose is to promote a higher standard of excellence in woodturning by providing an ever expanding source of information and resources to its membership.
